
Ace Your Online Job Interview

Ensure your hair is neatly styled and your face is clean. Pay attention to your facial hair if you have any.


2 Subtle Makeup

Lighting and Background

Natural Lighting

Camera Positioning

Eye Level

Look directly at the camera as if you're making eye contact with the interviewer. This conveys confidence and engagement.


Positive Body Language

Minimize Distractions

Silence
