Xero Payroll calculations

How payroll year settings work

Organisations that joined Xero after 15 September 2014 have a default payroll year setting of 364 days (52 weeks). Prior to this change, organisations could choose either a 364 or 365 day payroll year setting. If the 365-day option was selected, these organisations weren't automatically changed to 364 days.

The ability to view and adjust the payroll year settings was removed after September 2014 to avoid unnecessary confusion. This is also consistent with other accounting software providers who have moved to a 364 day calendar.

For employees on an annualised salary, the payroll year for an organisation will cause minor differences in some calculations in Payroll, such as hourly rates, annual salaries and leave accruals. It is ultimately a business decision which payroll year an organisation chooses to use.

If your preferred calendar needs to be updated at any time, you'll need to contact Xero support.

Payroll calculations

Xero Payroll uses the following calculations in a pay run, based on the payroll year and pay period.

If employees are paid weekly:

- 365 days per year divided by 7 days per week = 52.142857 weeks in a year
- 364 days per year divided by 7 days per week = 52 weeks in a year

If employees are paid fortnightly:

- 365 days per year divided by 14 days per fortnight = 26.0714 fortnights in a year
- 364 days per year divided by 14 days per fortnight = 26 fortnights in a year

If employees are paid monthly, the same calculation is used on both the 364 and 365 day payroll year setting for employees on annualised salaries who are paid on a monthly basis. Xero Payroll currently calculates their hours each month based on the number of business days in that month and the number of hours worked per week. The gross amount stays the same each month, based on the salary entered in the pay template, however the number of hours and hourly rate changes each month to achieve the gross amount.

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For example, Alex is paid an annual salary of \$90,000 and works 38 hours a week.

If Alex was on a weekly frequency, the calculation would be:

- \$90,000 divided by 52.142857 weeks (365 days) = \$1,726.03 gross pay per week
- \$90,000 divided by 52 weeks (364 days) = \$1,730.77 gross per week

If Alex was on a fortnightly frequency, the calculation would be:

- \$90,000 divided by 26.0714 fortnights (365 days) = \$3,452.06 gross pay per week
- \$90,000 divided by 26 fortnights (364 days) = \$3,461.54 gross pay per week

If Alex was on a monthly frequency, using July 2022 as an example, the calculation would be:

- \$90,000 divided by 12 months (the same for both 364 and 365) = \$7,500 gross pay per month.
As July has 21 business days, the hours and hourly rate would be:
 - 7.6 hours x 21 days = 159.60 hours for July 2022
 - \$7,500 gross pay divided by 159.60 hours = \$46.992481 gross pay per hour
